


Art in Action


Have been busy as ever meeting the 1st & 3rd Monday of the month to pursue individual art projects or have a go at a still life bought in by one of the group.

BTS

In Devon the majority of waste which isn't reused, recycled or composted is sent to one of two energy recovery facilities in Devon, one of which is Exeter's Energy From Waste Plant on Marsh Barton. In December a group of 20 went **Behind the Scenes** at the facility and enjoyed a very interesting talk and tour by two experts on Waste Management from Devon County Council. We saw the process by which 60,000 tonnes of non-recyclable waste is diverted from landfill annually to generate enough electricity to power the equivalent of 6,624 homes.

We'll be repeating this excellent visit in 2025 when another group can see what happens to the contents of our black bins and ask the experts anything they've ever wanted to know about recycling.





Genealogy Group

The Genealogy Group, ignoring the doom and gloom weather forecast, held their first meeting on Wednesday the 8th January at Cullompton Library. We reviewed several of the on-line digital tools made available by The Devon Family History Society for <u>'Free'</u> together with their calendar of events offering support for anyone researching their family tree. The research tool 'Ancestry Libraries Edition' certainly feels as though it has benefited from a recent upgrade (purely my opinion) or perhaps it's the work going on in the background refreshing the library internet (who knows?). I found quite a difference with the <u>Step 1</u> Grandfather or Grandmother search, once the basic information is complete the software ran a search in seconds producing some very interesting ancestor information, going much further than I have been able to go before. One personal nugget was discovering 4 relatives aboard the Mayflower bound for the New World in 1620.

In other news the u3a Subject Matter expert Stephen Dyer has published his January 2025 Newsletter <u>Click Here</u>, he touches on the free genealogy site '<u>familysearch.org</u>' and the 3 Billion records added to their database and the best way to search the site.

This month's highlight for those with an interest in Scottish Ancestry is, the University of St Andrews has made available for the first time a Historical Manuscript, renamed 'The Saint Andrews Chronicles', which is a history of and the origins of Scotland, including William Wallace and the Stone of Destiny.

Finally, there is the usual updates on new records from the Family History research sites and what we can expect to see in 2025, with new records from the established archives e.g. Parish Records, Military etc.

The next meeting is on Wednesday the 12th of February at the Hayridge Centre Cullompton Library from 10:30 until 12:30.

Live Jazz Music Appreciation

My piece this month is dedicated to "Walking in the Footprints of Jazz Music Giants"! In June 2024 I grasped the opportunity to embark on a Jazz Music Pilgrimage, whilst on a visit to the mid USA state of Indiana; (NOT, you will note dear reader, way down south in New Orleans, Louisiana!) where my journey took me instead, to the city of Richmond, the county seat of eastern Wayne County, bordering the state of Ohio, the home of the Starr Piano manufacturing company,

which was turning out as many as 40 finished new pianos each day in the early 1920s! A major employer in that city.


Music recording was in its infancy when the far-sighted owners of the Starr Piano company branched out by founding the Gennett Records recording company in 1917. by the late 1930s the label had produced more than 16,000 masters! As many of the different railroads crisscrossing the USA appeared to meet at the Richmond railhead, Gennett Records attracted growing numbers of the emerging jazz musicians to travel there in order to record and promote their special genre of music, which recordings we are amazingly still able to listen to, a full century after the first pressings were made!

Without the development of recording music sounds onto hard disks in that era, it is argued that our generation might never have even had the pleasure of hearing Jazz! Gennett Records was the first to capture sounds made by that horn "titan", Louis Armstrong, Delta blues giant Charley Patton and Hoagy Carmichael's famous "Stardust". These musical greats voluntarily sat surrounded by curtains, in an unventilated 85-degrees room, so that a wax disc would remain soft enough for a stylus to cut in sound vibrations; nearby trains passing by a few feet away, often ruined their takes!

Regrettably, very little remains of the old buildings where jazz history was made in the early 1920s, but fortunately, for "pilgrims" such as myself, the city historians have raised funds from Gennett family members, and dedicated others, to enable a Jazz Walk of Fame to be set out alongside a wide walkway located in the landscaped park in the part of the city previously occupied by the Starr Gennett music company. Here are placed raised plaques displaying record discs perpetuating the names and portraits of the many now famous musicians who trod this hallowed ground whilst making their way to and from the primitive recording studio; I was delighted and also humbled to walk in the footsteps of my many jazz heroes including Louis Armstrong, King Oliver, Fats Waller, Sidney Bechet, Bix Beiderbecke, Jelly Roll Morton, Earl Hines, Duke Ellington, Count Basie, Coleman Hawkins, Fletcher Henderson, Artie Shaw and Wendel Hall, to name but a few. The day felt truly atmospheric, the only absentee being the wonderful musical sounds made there long ago. What an experience!
