A very warm welcome to those new members who have joined us since the last newsletter was sent out.

July Speaker

Peter Isaacson, a volunteer for the charity Medical Detection Dogs (MDD), gave a very interesting talk with some video footage of how the training and use of these dogs occurs.

Dr Claire Guest OBE and Dr John Chapman got the ball rolling with Tangle and Daisy being two of the first dogs to learn detection techniques. Daisy gave Dr Guest an early warning of deep-seated breast cancer she had. A legacy from an advocate called Sylvia of £800,000 allowed a HQ to be built at Milton Keynes, Royal patronage- now Queen consort, with Dr john Church who today heads up the detection unit.

Dogs are purchased and bred and take two years to train, 20 minutes at a time three times per day using instant treat (food tidbit) rewards to progress also using clickers. No best breed, any will work, but Labradors and Spaniels are common. A dog's nose has 350,000,000 receptors and a large part of a dog's brain is given over to the sense of smell, allowing them to detect 1 part in a trillion! MDD can give advance warning to people with Parkinson's, Covid 19, Addison's, POTS, Cancer, PTSD, Type 1 Diabetes and many more ailments. MDD needs £2.5 million per year to carry on their good work. They have 89 dogs living with people currently, drastically improving their quality of life. They have great plans to extend this field of medical science in the future to save the NHS money with large scale early diagnosis.

(No title yet as we have no idea of the plot or the ending) ... Who came up with this daft idea?


Hazel's Introduction – (my summary)

At the end of the walk on our return to the Beambridge several participated of a light lunch and liquid refreshments which was appreciated by all. Best wishes Jackie








Walkers Next Walk Thursday July 17
















Quilting



Windows 10 – End of Support.

Any Member still using a Windows 10 based laptop of PC should be aware that Microsoft will officially end support for Windows 10 on October 14, 2025. This means that after that date, Windows 10 will no longer receive security updates, new features, or technical assistance from Microsoft. However, your Windows 10 computer will still function, but it will be vulnerable to security risks without those updates.

Home Telephone Network – Analogue Switch-off

As advised at the June monthly meeting, Members should aware that the 'old' copper cable driven telephone network (Analogue Network or PSTN) is being upgraded and replaced by a fully digital network. The target date for the switch-off of the PSTN shold have taken place to the end of 2025 but this has now been delayed to January 2027 because the telephone network infrastructure upgrade project has slipped.

Members should be informed by their telephone service provider (i.e. BT, Virgin, Sky Vodafone etc) when their home phone service is due to be migrated. If you already have a home phone that is connected via your internet connection (broadband router) you need not be concerned. If you think you will be affected or you have a specific concern, you should contact your service provider and ask when they will require all customers to use the new digital landline network.

The official government guidance is provided at https://www.gov.uk/guidance/uk-transition-from-analogue-to-digital-landlines. Ofcom states that communications providers should take steps to identify at-risk customers and engage in effective communications to ensure all eligible customers are protected throughout the upgrade process. They have also published a guide to treating

Mobile Phone Theft

The statistics show that there is a significant rise in the theft of mobile phones particularly by criminals on bikes and mopeds. Given the cost of today's smartphones – many are in excess of £750 – it's not surprising. The criminal network is fast and efficient, within one month a stolen phone could well be in China or Africa.

There are a number of things users can do:

- 1.
- 2. Use a strong PIN or password on the front screen.
- 3. Use biometric authentication face id of fingerprint.
- 4. Enable two factor verification.
- 5. Enable the phone tracking app Find my device etc.
- 6. Enable the phone's theft protection in your settings
- 7. Android Theft Protection
- 8. Apple Stolen Device Protection

There are plenty of YouTube tutorials online to help you with this issue.

In the event of your mobile phone being stolen, report it immediately to the police and your service provider, ideally providing the IMEI number. The IMEI number is a unique 15-digit serial number which can be used to identify, track and block mobile phones from accessing the network. It is on the box which came with your phone, or you can dial *#06# on your keypad or in your settings under "About phone". You might want to write down and keep it safe somewhere nearby!!
