A very warm welcome to those new members who have joined us since the last newsletter was sent out.

May Speaker

Paul Dean explained how he set up a truffle growing enterprise on his farm. Planting 2 acres with Hazel, Silver Birch, Beech & Oak trees inoculated with truffle spores. After 7 years you can expect some truffles, but they are hard to find as they grow underground, that's when you need a truffle hound. Paul has a Spaniel ATM who is quite good but used to have an excellent truffle hound sourced from Italy but sadly died 5 years ago.

You can find truffles in the UK growing wild, but they need a soil PH of 7.6, well drained yet moist conditions and pigs or wild Bore to spread the spores via their excreta as they love to eat them.


Truffles command a high price, with the Black winter truffle (Perigord truffle) fetching up to £3000/Kg

Over 100 other genera of fungi are also classified as truffles. Many truffles are rare and highly sought after as a gourmet delicacy. They have a complex flavour, often described as earthy, musky, used sparingly due to their potent aroma. They need to be used fresh (within 5 days) and do not keep at all well

Behind the Scenes

2nd April – Norman Lockyer Observatory nr Sidmouth We had a fine April day for the visit by 36 members to the Norman Lockyer Observatory, which is perched on top of Salcombe Hill to the east of Sidmouth. An introductory talk explained something of the background of Sir Norman Lockyer, a Victorian self-taught astronomer who used spectroscopy to identify the unknown element, Helium, in 1868. Lockyer was director of the Solar Physics Observatory in Kensington until it closed in 1912. On his retirement to Sidmouth he was able to raise money to set up the Hill Observatory [renamed the NLO after his death in1920]. At this stage there were 2 domes housing the Kensington and McCloud telescopes.

Our group were entertained by a modeling of the solar system using props, and a session in the Planetarium using a unique fully working



1963 Spitz A3p planetarium star projector with an impressive history. We were guided around the Northern and Southern hemispheres stars spotting the well-known constellations along the way. Next a tour of the historic telescopes and domes, some of which are over 100 years old.

Next, we went outside to view the historic telescopes on site, plus the Technology Centre. It's very impressive that the NLO operates as a centre for amateur astronomy, meteorology, radio astronomy and education, staffed only by volunteers.

.. The site is owned by East Devon District Council and operated by the Norman Lockyer Observatory Society (NLOS) who maintain the instrument, open the site to the public and run courses in astronomy.

The observatory has three historic working telescopes. The Lockyer (1863, rebuilt 1871), the Kensington (1840) and the McClean (1895) see photos. These mark the start of solar and astrophysics in Britain.



Creative Writing


Art in Action


Chris Howe was due to give the group a second session on Watercolour technique April 28th, but unfortunately was too ill to attend, wishing him a speedy recovery.


Quilting


University of Oxford - Research Opportunity


