Linda Kettle gave us an enlightening talk about her career as a theatre design director & production designer. Spurred on aged 15 after taking 'o' level craft, she went to Birmingham Theatre Design School, under the director Fin James who really pushed her, which ultimately made Lynda super tough and up for the challenge.

Costume design, set design, building model sets to get the choreography/perspective correct. Also, opera sets where the set must be really tall to look OK when the players are on stage Linda went to London to work during the 60's and met many famous stars, Mick Jagger & Sean Connery to name but a few. She moved back to the Midland Art Centre (MAC) aged 19 to be a Theatre designer, also worked in the puppet theatre on Basil Brush show, & Roland Rat.

The MAC shut after a few years, & Linda went on to work at BBC Pebble Mill studios, on such programs as the Brother's, Howard's way, Angels, Date with fate to name but a few. Aged fifty she became freelance and became a full-time artist, also teaching at Birmingham university. Today she has a studio in Sidmouth and runs art courses and gives talks, a very busy, talented, hardworking lady indeed.




#### **Art in Action**














# **History**
