# **Photography**



#### Craft



# Genealogy

It is good to be back into the swing of things after missing the March meeting due to a well-earned holiday with Paula!! We welcomed several new faces to the group and after a brief introduction everyone settled into the highs and lows of family research.

I mentioned in my last update that Stephen Dyer the u3a Subject Matter expert, has updated his Research Guide and his supporting notes on a range of specialist topics available to u3a members free of charge. If you have hit a brick wall with your research or just starting out, it is definitely worthwhile visiting the u3a website <a href="https://www.u3a.org.uk/learning/subjects/genealogy">https://www.u3a.org.uk/learning/subjects/genealogy</a> to view the Guide and contacting Stephen if you find something of interest.

While on the subject of Stephen Dyer do you read his monthly Newsletter? They are essential reading for all genealogy sleuths for example: -

The February issue mentioned an online worldwide event, 'RootsTech' (free of charge to take part) where you can learn from global genealogy experts. This site also produces a number of other free on-line genealogy workshops and presentations.

The March issue discusses the advantages of using DNA together with an online event run by 'Family Tree', who have also published a 100-page booklet entitled 'DNA Discoveries' and is a comprehensive guide to using DNA for family research.

The April issue covers the fallout from the bankruptcy of 23andMe and the steps you can take to secure your personal information.

There are also the usual updates from the commercial genealogy sites, highlights include: -

11 million new family history records including school records and shipyard registers from West Dumbartonshire are now available on Ancestry.

Welsh Catholic Baptisms, Marriages and Burials spanning 184 years, the Women's Land Army, Irish Huguenot Histories in the 16th and 19th centuries, are now available on Findmypast.

Lloyd George Domesday Survey Records for Essex with a new 'SmartSearch functionality on <a href="mailto:thegenealogist.co.uk">thegenealogist.co.uk</a> and the new Cousin Finder feature on MyHeritage.

## **Bridge**

The Bridge Group meets on Thursday afternoons at Willand Village Hall and plays from 2-4pm (not the first Thursday of the month as it is the main u3a monthly meeting).

We bring our different levels of experience of the game, with some members having started from scratch in January. Bridge is a partnership game for 4 players, but you do not need to come with a partner.

There are two parts to the game: a bidding process (an auction) to establish which couple think they have the best opportunity of winning. The couple who win the bidding process tries to fulfil their 'contract' which could be in a trump suit or in no-trumps.

The second part is a trick-taking game which has similarities to whist. From the partnership who won the bidding process, one person puts down their hand for all to see - 'the dummy hand' - and play commences...

Playing MINI-BRIDGE is a good way of getting started. It is a stripped-down

version of the game with the focus on play rather than the bidding process. Give it a try!
